

Make Your Vote Count Twice

By voting for an Independent or any other party your vote will count twice:

- *once when you don't vote for a Westminster party*

- *and once because you are supporting someone else.*

In some seats you may not have a suitable candidate to vote for. In this case you can write across your ballot paper “*none of the above*”. This will be counted as a “*vote cast*” and registered as a protest vote.
